Congratulations to Bernie Walker for her win at BBC Radio Leicester's Make a Difference Awards, bringing home the trophy in the category 'Key Worker'.

Nominated by colleagues, students and parents/carers, the recognition comes as a result of Bernie's tireless work during the pandemic. Providing support to students and

their families during challenging times, Bernie went above and beyond her call of duty to help others.

Keen to ensure students did not miss out on their education during lockdown, Bernie – an unsung hero of the education sector – took to the road to deliver work packs to those who needed them, at the same time as providing a friendly face to the school's families that were stuck in isolation.

But missed education was not the only fire she was fighting; 55% of our students are entitled to free school meals, so when the Government were unable to fulfil their free school meal voucher scheme, there was great concern for the families that relied on this support. Taking it upon herself to lessen the burden, Bernie developed a local voucher scheme which ensured that New College families could access nutritional food while the school was closed.

Speaking on the accolade, Mrs Jane Brown, Principal at New College, said: "Bernie is already a local hero in that she lives locally and is extremely community minded. Always putting other people first, Bernie has New College Leicester and New Parks running through her veins.

"During the pandemic, she was a constant force for good and consistently went out of her way to help. No matter what she was asked to do, or took it upon herself to do, she always did it with a smile on her face – because the children come first."

Bernie Walker said: "I feel truly honoured to have won this award. My only aim is to help people within the New College community, and being thanked in this way is something I will remember forever. Thank you to everybody who took the time to nominate me and to those who make the work I do even more enjoyable."

Providing a platform for sharing success, the recognition identifies where we are now in terms of PESSPA achievement, and direction for the future.

Quality Careers at New College Leicester

We are proud to have retained the Quality in Careers Standard Gold award, recognising the quality and breadth of our careers provision.

The Quality in Careers Standard is the national quality award for careers education, information, advice and guidance (CEIAG) in secondary schools, colleges and work-based learning. Accessible in England, Northern Ireland, the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands, the standard is fully aligned with the Gatsby Benchmarks for Good Career Guidance.

Following an in-depth external assessment, New College Leicester was praised for its use of CEIAG, which underpins the whole school ethos and, as acknowledged by the assessor, raises "student aspiration through activities which develop ambition, self-confidence, communication and employability skills."

The assessment included a review of New College Leicester's evidence portfolio, turning the spotlight on four key areas:

- 1. Management the effectiveness of systems for planning, managing and implementing CEIAG
- 2. Information the accessibility, relevance, importance and effectiveness of information
- 3. Advice and Guidance the effectiveness of an integrated programme of advice, guidance and support
- 4. Career Learning how effectively the curriculum supports the development of learners' knowledge, skills, understanding and attitudes

A fifth component, Learning Outcomes, is also assessed in person via the learners.

Valid for two years, the award is highly regarded – and the latest Department for Education's (DfE) statutory guidance to colleges builds heavily upon the 8 Gatsby Benchmarks for "Good Careers Guidance", strongly recommending that all secondary schools work towards and achieve the national Quality in Careers Standard.

Speaking on the success, our Principal, Mrs Jane Brown, said: "We are delighted that our Career Mark assessment has successfully passed the verification process again and it's a credit to our entre team to have consistently achieved the high standard demanded by the award.

"Our Careers and Employability Strategy provides a strategic framework and direction that recognises the challenges of New College Leicester's location and associated deprivation indicators, with a commitment to breaking the cycle of disadvantage and improving social mobility, which is a key part of the school's masterplan.

And success, in this instance, can be measured by the size of our sixth form. Once large, we now have just a few sixth form students — this is because our students, as a result of the programme, now have the confidence and self-belief to travel into the city centre and further afield; with 87% of students going into other city based Further Education or sixth form college establishments. Another success indicator is the low number of those students not in employment, education or training.

These workshops promoted teamwork, problem-solving and communication — three important skills that will benefit them throughout their education, personal, and eventually, professional lives.

They also incorporated the 4 R's: Respect, Responsibility, Resilience and Resourcefulness – the values that we, as a school, hold most dear.

The students thoroughly enjoyed their staycation, and wished they could have stayed longer. Here's a selection of their comments:

"I learnt a lot of information and the process about law making."


"This was my best trip experience ever!"

Mathematics Matters!

We have had a particular focus on maths over recent years, because maths really does matter at New College Leicester. Our Head of Mathematics, Mr Michael Anyon, explains why being numerate and comfortable with Mathematics is important for any role in society.



Mathematics plays a significant role in the society we live in and is an important tool for addressing many challenges across a variety of careers. The acquisition of basic skills of Mathematics is vital for the life opportunities and achievements of our students.

We recognise that being literate and numerate is important for any role in society, and we aim to develop key life skills, encouraging students to be reflective, critical thinkers with an 'I can' mentality.

We believe that every child can achieve in Mathematics, and we have developed a curriculum that allows them to do this.

A recent review of the faculty observed an "extensive investment in manipulatives [which] help students visualise 'real' Mathematics", noting that "there has also been an investment in Continuous Professional Development (CPD) for staff and the results of this strategy have been significant."

The Mathematics Faculty has seen year-on-year improvement, and we regularly review and refine the curriculum, keeping up to date with relevant pedagogies, sharing best practice and improving outcomes for students.

Through a well-structured and carefully sequenced curriculum, students develop their conceptual understanding of Mathematics by modelling situations using concrete materials and relating them to pictorial and abstract representations. Over time, students are able to translate meaning across the different types of representation, as they develop their ability to reason and solve problems and their fluency improves.

To cite a couple of examples, the faculty review commented on an "extensive use of manipulatives which helped students understand algebra" and that "concrete materials were used to construct improper fractions, visually enabling students to gain a fluent understanding."

Regular ongoing formative assessments ensure that students progress at an appropriate pace, constantly building on prior learning. Since mathematical knowledge is hierarchical, a good attendance is paramount to success and students who demonstrate this commitment to their learning make good progress. Where attendance is good, outcomes for students are also good, even exceeding national headline figures.



Duke of Edinburgh Success for Year 11s

In September, eight of our year 11 students embarked on a two-day expedition for their bronze Duke of Edinburgh (DofE) award.

Led by New College Leicester's DofE Manager, Mr Hepworth-Adcock and DofE Leader, Miss Wain, the team had to plan their own countryside expedition and show that they can navigate their way using nothing but a map and compass — all whilst carrying heavy camping equipment and supplies.

The team spent two days hiking around

Leicestershire – proving they can navigate successfully – and spent one-night camping at Beaumanor Hall.

As part of the expedition, the students needed to demonstrate basic campcraft skills such as pitching a tent and cooking a meal on a Trangia stove, and developed some important life skills along the way including orienteering, communication, resilience, teamwork and volunteering. They will use these skills later in life through their future studies and work.

Having successfully navigated their way through Leicestershire's countryside, the group completed their expedition and will be rewarded with a bronze DofE award.

By taking part and successfully completing the challenge, the students have also enhanced their CVs and improved their future employment opportunities.







New College says 'NO' to Bullying!

In October we welcomed 15 year old Belle Kumble-Rose into New College Leicester to share her experiences of bullying and cyberbullying, and speak to our students about how these two things impacted her mental health.

The purpose of Belle's visit was to promote positive mental health strategies, to ensure that our students are equipped with the right knowledge and skills to prevent and/or deal with bullying of any kind.

Belle, who has been a victim of bullying in the

past, performed some of her music, told her story and shared advice with our students. She also offered guidance on how to maintain high levels of personal safety.

Organised by our Head of Health and Wellbeing, Mrs Samantha Kopicki, with the help of The Prime Agency, the learning outcomes for our students were a) to recall the different types of bullying, b) to describe ways of staying safe online and c) to explain strategies for promoting positive mental health.

This was a perfect opportunity for our year 10s to get more insight into what their exam paper later this year will consist of, increasing their analytical skills and understanding of decision-making process.

Engaged and Inquisitive Year 7 Students Step Back In Time!

The City of Leicester is steeped in history and a recent walking tour by year 7 students provided the opportunity to enrich and enhance their understanding of the city's historical significance. After the restrictions of Covid, it was great to be out and about providing first-hand experience of the history that surrounds us.

We're fortunate in Leicester in having so much evidence of this available on the streets we use every day and in our wonderful museums. The tour covered centuries of history and featured key sites such as Newarke Gateway, Jewry Wall, St. Nicholas Church, Leicester Castle, St. Mary's de Castro Church, Turret Gateway and Trinity Hospital. One of the 54 students taking part in the experience commented:

"It was educational yet fun! My favourite part of the day was the walking tour around Leicester."

The positive attitude of the students impressed history teacher, Miss Lehane, who noted:

"The students were fully engaged and inquisitive, asking further questions to discover more about Leicester's history, particularly during the walking tour."

The immersive learning experience continued with a visit to Newarke Houses Museum which incorporates the museum of the Royal Leicestershire Regiment along with a range of exhibits illustrating post-medieval and contemporary Leicester. The military displays cover artefacts depicting life on the front-line and at the home front during both world wars. The displays feature a model trench and a Morrison Shelter which was a star attraction for one of the students who said:

"I love learning about World War One, so I really enjoyed learning about life in the trenches and the local connections to the war."





Miss Lehane summed up the successful day saying,

"The students were excellent and represented the school brilliantly which was recognised by all the teachers and museum staff. Thank-you to our year 7 students for helping to make our day of historical discovery so successful. Nothing beats first-hand experience like this!"

New College Leicester students were given a rare opportunity to tour Leicester City Football Club's state of the art Sports Turf Academy, followed by watching both the goal keepers' training session and the outfield players training session. Opened in 2020, the Academy, located north of the city at Seagrave boasts the highest specification facility in Europe and needless to say, made a huge impression on our students.

Organised with the aim of raising the students' awareness of careers available in the sport and to give them the privileged access to the extensive facilities at the ground, the encounter

with various players and seeing training in action were added bonuses.

On arrival at the training ground, the students received a warm welcome from Youri Tielemans, Leicester's midfielder and Belgium national team member and defender Timothy Castagne who also plays for Belgium. This reception alone was exciting enough but the tour of the outstanding training facilities at the ground had everyone buzzing with excitement.

Highlights of the tour included the customised gym and hydrotherapy facilities, including the pool and changing facilities and the Vichai Srivaddhanaprabha building which is the site's primary training, medical, and administrative hub for the First Team and Academy. The opportunity to see the training session of the first team goalies was another plus, made extra special when first team goalkeeper Danny Ward popped across for a chat. More rubbing shoulders with the great and the good of LCFC came when manager, Brendan Rodgers, kindly came over to shake hands with the students.

The outfield training session which was taking place gave the students chance to watch England stars James Maddison and Harvey Barnes in action. More star players were encountered when our students watched the players' recovery sessions and it was great for our students to be able to have a chat with them.

The visit to LCFC's Academy actually rendered some of our students momentarily speechless when they met the players. It was a visit full of varied interest, described by one student as a 'once in a lifetime experience.' It was certainly a visit they'll never forget!
